

#### To apply:

- 2. Log in to your ctcLink Student Homepage and choose the Financial Aid tile:
  - Check the status of your financial aid award.
  - Verify there are no outstanding documents needed to finalize your award.
  - Review your award amounts.
- 3. Manage your financial aid, review financial aid terms and conditions

Communication of financial aid status will be sent to the student's preferred email address.

#### GRANTS

Federal, state and Pierce College grants are awarded to eligible students with financial need (as determined by the FAFSA/WASFA).

#### STUDENT LOANS

Federal Direct Stafford Loans are available to students who complete a FAFSA application. There are two types of Stafford Loans: subsidized and unsubsidized. Subsidized Direct Stafford Loans are based on financial need. Subsidized loans do not accrue interest while you are enrolled at least half-time. Unsubsidized Direct Stafford Loans are not need based. Unsubsidized Stafford Loans will accrue interest after they are disbursed to your student account. Both must be repaid.

A book buy back service is offered for students who do not wish to keep their textbooks. The value of a book is determined by the demand for that title nationally. Students can receive up to half the current value, depending on the time of the term. The bookstore does buyback on a daily basis, but the best time is during the last 2-3 weeks of each term.

The Pierce College Dental Hygiene Clinic, located at Pierce College Fort Steilacoom, provides low-cost preventive and limited restorative dental services to the public.

WHO WE SERVE: Everyone! All ages from 4 years old and up.

#### WHO PERFORMS THE SERVICES & WHAT SERVICES are OFFERRED?

Dental hygiene students perform all services in our new, state of the art Dental Clinic under the expert supervision and guidance of licensed, professional dental hygienists and dentists. Services include oral health assessments, dental x-rays, preventive and desensitizing services, nonsurgical periodontal services, sealants, limited restorative (tooth-colored and silver fillings), and fluoride treatments. Local anesthesia (numbing) and nitrous oxide (laughing gas) are available.

HOW DOES A TEACHING CLINIC WORK? Your first appointment is a one-hour, free, limited oral health assessment to determine whether your oral health treatment needs can be serviced in our clinic. Please note that as a teaching clinic, appointments typically last up to four hours in length, and it may take several appointments to complete your treatment. Patients must be able and willing to make this time commitment.

**FEES?** We are a fee-at-time-of-service clinic, and accept Washington State Healthcare Authority (WSHC) Coverage for dental care - Apple Health Medicaid. Our regular fees are approximately 80-90% less than private dental offices. Additionally, we offer special discounts to current Pierce College Students and Military (veterans, active-duty and their dependents) for select preventive and non-surgical periodontal services. For other dental insurance coverages, please contact your insurance company to see if they will reimburse you since payment is required at time of service.

HOURS OF OPERATION? The dental hygiene clinic is open when the college is in session and classes are scheduled.



## NOTIFICATION OF STUDENTS' RIGHTS UNDER THE FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a federal law regarding the privacy of student education records and the obligations of the institution to maintain confidentiality of these records. In accordance with FERPA, students have the right to: inspect and review their education records; request the amendment of an education record they believe is inaccurate, misleading or in violation of the student's rights of privacy; have some control over the disclosure of information from their education records; and file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the college to comply with the requirements of FERPA. For more information, review the FERPA web page noted above.

#### STUDENT RIGHT TO PRIVACY

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act prohibits the release of student information to anyone other than the student, unless the student has provided express written permission. Students must provide photo ID when requesting transcripts, a copy of their class schedule, a Pierce College ID card, or any other student record information.

Students have a right to review their records and to request an amendment to those records. Only a student's name, dates of enrollment, degrees awards and honors received, enrollment status, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, and the weight and height of members of athletic teams can be released as directory information that does require student authorization. Students must sign a release in order to have any other information disclosed. Students can also sign a request to withhold all directory information. Educational records may be released to school officials with legitimate educational interests and to other institutions in which a student intends to enroll. Information may be released to a third party without a student's consent if an emergency situation exists or if information is requested officially by means of a subpoena, court order or legal report. Additionally, federal law requires student information to be released to military recruiters, when officially requested.

At the time of degree/certificate awarding, students who have earned a cumulative college-level grade point average of 3.5 or above for all Pierce College credits with a minimum of 25 college level credits earned at Pierce College will be considered an Honors Graduate.

Pierce College is committed to the academic success of its students. #### **GRADING SYSTEM AND POLICY**

Pierce College's grading system provides a permanent record reflecting student performance and achievement. Grades are reported as decimals to the nearest tenth. Grade point averages (GPA) are computed to the nearest hundredth. The numeric grades shown in the columns below will appear on the student record. The letter grades are an approximate equivalency guide to the official Pierce College decimal grades.

Specific decimal grades may be required to meet a class prerequisite, maintain good academic standing, receive credit toward a degree, and meet various program-specific requirements.

#### **GRADE SYMBOLS**

Grade missing or not yet issued.

- **Incomplete**: Issued when a student has been delayed in completing the required work. To receive an "I" the student and instructor sign an Incomplete Contract by the last day of the instructional term. Time limit for removal of "I" grade is determined by the instructor, but not to exceed four terms following the term in which the grade was issued. An "I" grade on a transcript after one year (four terms) will be automatically converted to a "0.0" without instructor input.
- **NC** No Credit: Faculty-initiated grade. This grade is not computed in the grade point average and cannot be changed.

P/NP Pass/No Pass: Not computed in GPA.

- **Repeated Course:** An "R" shows beside the lower grade(s) received and only the highest grade is computed in the GPA.
- **S** Satisfactory: Indicates the student is making satisfactory progress but has not completed all the competencies for a given level of instruction. No credit is awarded. The "S" grade is used only for ABE and ESL classes numbered under 100. Courses with "S" grade designators cannot be applied toward any degree or certificate program.
- W Withdrawal: Student-initiated by following official withdrawal pro-
- **WE Excused Withdrawal:** Administrative withdrawal issued by the college when a student has extenuating circumstances. Students must petition to the Registrar.

#### **GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA)**

Grade point averages are calculated by dividing the grade points by the credit hours completed.

#### **GRADE CHANGES**

Grade changes are made only when a legitimate error has been made in computing, reporting or recording a grade, or when a temporary grade such as "I" Incomplete) needs to be changed to a permanent grade.

Grade changes will be accepted and posted to a student record up to four terms (including summer) following the term in which the original grade was issued. Exceptions to the four-term time limit may be made only in cases of documented grading errors.

An "I" grade on a transcript after one year (four terms) will be automatically converted to a "0.0."

Questions about grades should be directed to the class instructor immediately. A grade becomes a permanent part of a student's record four terms (including summer) following the term of the class.

#### PASS/NO PASS

Students may take courses for pass/no pass credit. Pass credits may or may not apply toward a degree or certificate. Check with your advisor for details. Courses that are prerequisites for other courses should not be taken pass/no pass.

The student and instructor must sign a pass/no pass contract before the last instructional day of the term.

Students may withdraw from a class being taken pass/no pass by following the same procedures as for any other class.

#### **REPEATING A COURSE**

Students may repeat a course to improve their grades. All class grades remain on the transcript but only the highest class grade is calculated in the GPA. The College administratively calculates and posts the repeat designation on repeated classes.

Students planning to transfer should be aware that the policies of other colleges and universities may follow different policies when computing

#### **AUDITING A COURSE**

To audit a class, a student must register, pay tuition and/or fees, and attend class regularly, but will not need to take examinations and will not receive credit for the course. Most classes offered by the college are open to audit. A student may change from credit to audit or audit to credit through the 10th day (eighth day in summer term or for courses at Joint Base Lewis-McChord) of the instructional term with permission of the instructor.





All students are advised that the Pierce College Marketing & Communications Office takes photographs and shoots videos throughout the year which may include images (as well as audio/ video recordings of voices) of members of the student body and reserves the right to use them for publicity, promotional and marketing purposes. As a general practice, there is no attempt to collect individual photo release forms from students. However, students who do not wish to have their images/voices used for this purpose must stipulate this in writing to Marketing & Communications at the beginning of the term.
